CONDITIONS FOR SALES UNDER THE AUSPICES OF THE NGUNI CATTLE BREEDERS' SOCIETY.

Nguni stud breeding is subject to the stipulation of the Animal Improvement Act and conforms to the standards of The Nguni Cattle Breeders Society. The Society therefore has the right to implement certain controls to ensure the accuracy of information regarding Parentage, Performance and Estimated Breeding Values.

Information regarding Parentage, Performance and Estimated Breeding Values of animals, as supplied by the breeder, have been verified and compared to the official database held on the database of the Society's official Registering Authority, SA Studbook. The Nguni Cattle Breeders' Society therefore, confirms the accuracy of such information.

To the knowledge of the Society these controls have been carried out accurately. However, the Society does not take any responsibility for incorrect information through printing errors.

Animals on such sales have been visually screened by Inspectors of The Nguni Cattle Breeders' Society and comply with the Nguni Minimum Breed Standards as stipulated by the Society.

In terms of the requirements for the sale of animals under the auspices of the Nguni Cattle Breeders' Society, bulls that are presented must within the preceding three month period have been tested by a veterinarian in respect of breeding soundness (external genitals, internal genitals, rectal examination, macro and microscopic evaluation of semen sample) and must have tested negative in respect of Trichomoniasis, Vibriosis, CA and TB. Breeders are advised to run tested bulls separate from females until the date of the sale (Section 2.5 from Schedule G2). All other animals must have tested negative in respect of TB and CA as close as possible to but not more than three months prior to the sale date. (Section 2.6 of Schedule G2).

The Society DOES NOT however, have any control over:

- Immunization and the general health status of animals
- Suitability of a bull for breeding
- Fertility status of animals
- Unregistered animals
